Botanix pruning tip...

Spring-flowering (before May) shrubs such as forsythia, deutzia, lilac, viburnum, mock-orange, and spirea, flowers on buds formed the previous summer or fall. To ensure maximum flowering, these shrubs should be pruned as soon as possible after flowers fade in the spring.

Summerflowering
(May or later)
shrubs flower on
new growth produced in the current
growing season. They
should be pruned before
new growth begins in the
spring. Summer and fallflowering shrubs include

abelia, beautyberry, butterfly bush, Rose of Sharon, crepemyrtle, and summersweet.

Hydrangeas are an exception to the rule. They are summer bloomers but should be pruned immediately after flowering.

Plant of the month - Hydrangeas, a beautiful shrub...

Hydrangeas are one of the most beautiful shrubs to grow in our climate. Not only do they bloom for a very long time, but the blooms can be left on during the winter to create in-

terest in your garden. Some people even harvest the dried flower heads for use in flower arrangements.


The name Hydrangea translates directly to "water loving", which means in general a Hydrangea plant prefers to be planted in a moist location. If a Hydrangea plant dries out,

the flowers and leaves will become very droopy, but will bounce back quickly if watered in time.

The most commonly known Hydrangeas are the ones with round snowball like blooms. Annabelle Hydrangeas, with their large white flowers, have been around for many, many years and are considered to be one of the most reliable shrubs for shady locations. Several varieties of Hydrangeas have been introduced since then, with the most famous one

being Endless Summer. Endless Summer Hydrangea was a break-through variety, as it blooms on both old and new wood, which enables it to bloom from late spring through to the

fall. This variety also has the ability to have either pink or blue blooms. If your soil is sweet, the flowers will be a pale pink. If your soil is acidic, the flowers will be blue. For those who would prefer blue flowers, adding aluminum sulfate to the soil, will produce the desired results. More recent introduc-



If you have one of these Hydrangeas in your garden, mulching it heavily during the winter months may give the plant the additional protection it needs to bloom.

Sun loving Hydrangeas tend to have a cone shaped flower. Vanilla Strawberry Hydrangea was an introduction last year. This variety has huge blooms that have a triple colour progression, meaning that they start out white, become pink and then finally a strawberry red colour. Quite often the plant will have flowers of each colour blooming at once, giving it an unique appearance. Phantom Hydrangea is the new improved Limelight variety, with bigger flowers and stronger stems. The flowers start out lime green and then become a pinkish white. Grafted Hydrangeas are perfect little trees to be used as an accent plant for city gardens. This year Pinky Winky Hydrangea, with its lacey pink cone shaped flowers, is available in a tree form.

Did you know that...

to bloom (e.g. lilies)

Winterizing your garden...

Now that the days are getting shorter and cooler, it is time to start thinking about putting our gardens to bed for the winter. Some plants need special care in order to survive our harsh winter climate.

Roses, especially Hybrid Tea, Floribunda and Grandiflora Roses need to be hilled up for the winter. This can



be done in two different ways. One method is to simply create a mound of soil or mulch around the base of the plant, which should come at

least ten inches up the branches. This can use up a fair amount of soil, so alternately you can purchase a device called a rose collar. This is a tube shaped tool, which is to be secured around the branches at the base of the rose, which is then filled up with soil or mulch. The tube helps hold the soil in place during the winter months. Never prune roses in the autumn; they should be done early spring in our climate.

Japanese Maples are at the edge of hardiness in our area. They should always be planted in a sheltered location, away from the cold western and northern winter winds. Regardless of where your Japanese Maple is planted, it is recommended

that for the first couple of years, when the plant is at it's most vulnerable, they should be wrapped with burlap during the winter shorter and cooler, it is time to start thinking about putting our months.

This is also true of Rhododendrons, Azaleas and Pieris plants.

Other plants, that are near the edge of hardiness in our area, which would benefit from some additional winter protection, are Eastern Redbud trees, Flowering Dogwoods and Beech trees.

Some plants, which are very hardy, such as Emerald Cedars and Dwarf Alberta Spruces, benefit from wrapping with burlap if they are in an area where it is very windy. Although these plants rarely die from winterkill, they can get winter burn, which turns the needles an unsightly brown colour, and while the buds

are still alive, it does take awhile for the new flush of growth to cover the damaged areas. A wrapping of burlap greatly reduces winter burn.

If we are having a dry fall, it is

particularly important to give your evergreens a good deep drink before the ground freezes. This allows evergreens to take up enough water to help get them through a long winter.

Fruit trees should have tree guards wrapped around their trunks, to stop rabbits and mice from girdling the trunks during

the long winter months.

Other important tasks to do in the fall, include raking up and removing or destroy-

ing any leaves that were diseased. This includes Maple leaves with Black Tar spots on them and heavily mildewed leaves. By removing these leaves, you reduce the chance that you will have the same problem next year.

Fall checklist for your garden:

- Before the first frost, spread a layer of mulch around trees and shrubs to protect roots.
- Winterize your Rose Bushes, Azaleas, Rhododendrons, Yews, Alberta Spruce, and Upright Junipers.
- Many perennials need to be cut back 15-20cm.
- Feed your lawn with Botanix Fall Fertilizer; the nutrients will help protect the grass throughout the winter and gives it a good boost for next spring.
- O Protect your less hardy plants when winter sets in by wrapping them in burlap. Burlap available in-store.
- O Pull out your annuals and put them on the compost pile. Get your garden ready and plant your springflowering bulbs like tulips, daffodils, hyacinths etc.
- To get some good fall colour, plant some hardy mums and icicle pansies. We have plenty in stock and they are in full bloom.
- Seed over bare spots in lawn.
- Rake up fallen leaves and add to compost pile.
